Saving Private Ryan



How can one say to have seen classic American movie without having seen the heartbreaking film about the Second World War by Steven Spielberg *Saving Private Ryan* ? This work of 1998 was excellently played by, among others, Tom Hanks (Captain Josh H. Miller) and Matt Damon (Private Ryan). Through this film, the author wanted to show the political hierarchy. He shows this with the order given to the soldiers to rescue one of their own. Also this film shows the solidarity between soldiers.

Saving Private Ryan takes place during the Second World War. It begins with the landing on the Normandy coast, France. Gunfire and explosions resound everywhere and soldiers fall one after the other on the ground and in the sea turning red with blood. You can even see a man getting his arm ripped off! It's sickening!

I found that the final battle is an important moment because the struggle of the soldiers to save Ryan is really impressive! "James earn this ... earn it" is the last thing that a soldier told Ryan before dying. This scene is in my opinion, the most moving and saddest of this film because a hero died to save a stranger, just because he was ordered.
